Bishop Louis Cober called the Fourth Annual Meeting into session at 8:30 AM on Saturday, April 30. Pastor Eduardo Llanes of the Kendall congregation, Miami, Florida, brought the devotional message from Judges 6:11 reminding us of our privilege to serve a Mighty God.

ARTICLE IV

BISHOP'S REPORT TO THE 1994 ANNUAL MEETING

To the Fourth Annual Meeting of the Southeast Regional Conference of the Brethren in Christ Church convening at Grace Community Church, Lawrenceville, Georgia. Greetings! It is a superb delight to be meeting today in these new facilities hosted by Pastor Chuck Anderson and receiving the generous hospitality of the Grace Community Church family. In all of this we clearly sense God is at work and building His Church in the Southeast Conference.

In 1993 there were some personnel shifts in the bishop's office. Noreen Villocino resigned from her part-time role as receptionist/secretary to begin a full-time job. I express thanks to Noreen for her faithfulness and excellence in caring for the office responsibilities. Since November, Ruth, my wife, has been serving in the office part time as receptionist/secretary. Evelyn Longenecker, who with her husband Neal, manage Upland Manor, is available to give assistance as needed.

Southeast Conference congregations, some more zealously than others, have continued to work on the denominational 5-year plan for placing priority on evangelism (proclamation) and discipleship (obedience) in the local setting. The denomination has, during 1993, redesigned the time frame so that the third year (of the 5-year plan) would begin with January 1994. Each congregation, led by the pastor and supportive local leadership, should reevaluate their current plans and progress for intentional evangelism and discipleship. The purpose of the local congregation, of course, is to reach out with the Good News leading children, youth and adults to a personal life-changing encounter with Jesus Christ, our Living Lord, and then systematically disciple them through study (and application) of the Scriptures, worship and fellowship.

Of the thirty congregations in the Southeast conference, seventeen showed an increase in church membership in 1993. Seven reported a loss of members and six congregations remained unchanged from 1992 membership. Four new Spanish speaking congregations were begun in the Miami area in 1993 reporting a total of 76 members. The Southeast Conference in 1993 added a net increase of 146 members, a 10.44 percent increase.

We praise God for the conversions in 1993 in the Southeast Conference: eighteen children and 105 youth/adults, a total of 123 conversions for the year. There were also 84 baptisms reported for 1993.

A little more than half of the congregations (16) reported an increase in Sunday morning worship attendance in 1993. Of these congregations several did show commendable increases. They are:

Little Havana (up 20 persons or 50 percent), **Cristo Vive** (up 86 persons or 34.8 percent), **Grace Community** (up 14 or 29.2 percent), **East Lake** (up 5 or 16.7 percent) and **Kendall** (up 17 or 14.8 percent). **Congratulations** to each of these five **pastors/congregations** for this excellent record. Nine congregations showed attendance losses in 1993 and five remained unchanged from the previous year.

There were no pastoral replacements in the conference in 1993. However, I am grateful to Eduardo Llanes for leadership in arranging for pastors to serve the four new Miami area congregations begun in the past year.

Our goal continues to be the functioning of 20 vibrant, Hispanic congregations in the Miami area by year 2000, the turn of the century. Reaching this goal is realistic in that the planting of only two new Hispanic churches each year from 1995 through 1999 would bring us to the goal of 20 churches.

For several years the Kendall, Florida congregation, led by Pastor Eduardo Llanes, met for worship on Sunday mornings in the chapel at a nearby Baptist hospital. Though seating was available for only 90 persons, attendance sometimes reached 130 to 140. Since a larger worship facility was needed to allow for continued growth, 3000 square feet were rented in Las Americas business plaza and remodelled for church use by the Kendall congregation. The move from the hospital chapel to the business plaza facilities was made in August 1993.

In 1993, the Southeast Regional Conference purchased 4.4 acres of land located at 12101 SW 55th Street, Miami. It is anticipated that this land will ultimately become the site for facilities to be used by the Kendall congregation and as a meeting place for larger groups of people from the Miami area Brethren in Christ churches.

The nineteen congregations and one fellowship which participated in Cooperative Ministries proportionate giving in 1993 are to be commended. A special thanks to the Bethel (VA) congregation for their strong and faithful support of denominational ministries through Cooperative Ministries.

There were twelve congregations which made no contribution in 1993 to Cooperative Ministries. Four of these churches had increased total giving in 1993 over 1992, and four are recently begun Hispanic congregations. I am requesting every congregation of the regional conference to participate in the support of Cooperative Ministries in 1994 ... no exceptions! Let's have a 100 percent response in the Southeast Conference.

I am grateful for the stewardship demonstrated in the Conference of increased total giving in 1993, an increase of \$98,015 over 1992 or 12.5 percent. The following congregations are recognized and commended for increasing their giving over the previous year. **Kendall** (385.3 percent), **Grace Community** (121.2 percent), **Ridge View** (20.4 percent), **Beulah Chapel** (18.3 percent), **Winchester** (15.3 percent), **Cristo Vive** (13.8 percent), **Millerfields** (13 percent) and **Knifley** (10.9 percent.)

The future of the Southeast Conference looks bright if the fine people and churches of this region continue to evangelize, disciple believers, plant new churches and give generously to support the work of Kingdom building.

In 1990 the General Conference authorized the Kentucky and Tennessee congregations of the Central Conference to join with the Virginia, Georgia and Florida congregations of the Atlantic Conference in the formation of the **Southeast Regional Conference**. This action brought various parts of "the South" together in a most delightful way. The bonding of relationships throughout the region was made a high priority. This bonding grew and developed almost immediately, succeeding even beyond our expectations.

The General Board of Administration has prepared proposals for General Conference action in 1994 that indicate the congregations of Kentucky and Tennessee are to again be returned to the Central Conference. **To our brothers and sisters in Kentucky and Tennessee we say, "You have made a valuable contribution to the Southeast Conference. You will be missed! We wish you God's blessing as you again become the southern part of the Central Conference."**

This is my final report to the Annual Meeting as bishop of the Southeast Conference as I am discontinuing service in this administrative role when my current term is completed in July of this year. I have appreciated your cooperation and support as we have attempted to mold a new Regional Conference, the Southeast, to provide a functional, vital ministry in the '90's. Ruth and I have learned to love you as brothers and sisters in the Lord and as valued friends. We wish "y'all" well in the days ahead and encourage your whole-hearted cooperation and support of the ones who will follow us as bishop couple in the Southeast Conference.

Some have asked about our plans for the future. After taking several weeks for a cross country move and some time for renewal, Ruth and I will become the pastoral couple in mid-September at the **Palmyra Brethren in Christ Church** (Atlantic Conference), located near Hershey and Harrisburg in South Central Pennsylvania. We are being strengthened by your prayers, love and words of encouragement during these days of transition. We say a heart-felt, "Thank you."

During this time of discerning God's will for our lives, my attention has been drawn to Jeremiah 29:11 (NIV). **"For I know the plans I have for you,"** declares the Lord, **"plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future..."**. This promise sustains and encourages us as we move into a new and challenging ministry. It is likewise a reliable promise for the Southeast Conference to claim during this time of transition in leadership. May God make 1994 a fruitful year of outreach, growth, and Kingdom building for the Southeast Conference.

There are still three months before our term as bishop couple of the Southeast Conference is complete and we intend to continue to be conscientious and faithful in this leadership role. We will cooperate with our successor(s) to effect an orderly transfer of responsibilities. And while there will likely be other opportunities to say "fare-well", with sincere hearts we say to the constituency of this Annual Meeting, "Farewell, we love you, and God bless the Southeast Conference."

ARTICLE V BOARD OF DIRECTORS

A. General

The Board of Directors has met in two regular sessions since last Annual Meeting, in August at the Millerfields Church in Kentucky and in January at East Lake church in Florida. In addition we met in joint session with the Bishops Selection Committee and General Church Leaders John Byers and Harvey Sider in November to dialogue on the proposals for structural change. At our August meeting we met in Executive Session by phone conference with Harvey Sider to discuss ways of funding a full-time bishop for the Southeast Conference.

As a Board we have struggled with the proposed changes and sought for creative ways to function as a conference. The word, for me

and I think most of this board, that most nearly describes our feelings at this point is frustration. How do we plan for the future of our Conference when we have no idea in what form or even if it will exist after General Conference in July?

The good news to report is that our Spanish speaking congregations are increasing, both in number of congregations and as individual congregations. We have finally been able to purchase property for future development for the Kendall congregation as well as find a larger, short term meeting location for them. We truly praise God for His guidance through this process.

We also approved an increase in the construction loan for Grace Community and have been working with Dayspring Covenant as they seek to find a resolution to their continuing financial crisis. This is an ongoing study and further information and perhaps a recommendation will be forthcoming at this Annual Meeting.

Our board would like to express our appreciation to the Board for Ministry for their work in the conference and for providing for workshops and seminars at our Annual Meetings these four years.

We as a board want to express our deep appreciation and heartfelt thanks to Bishop Cober and Ruth for their leadership over these past four years as we have attempted to forge this new conference into a working entity. Not only did he have the challenge of organizing a new conference but of doing so with people who have had, for the most part, little involvement or knowledge of working in general church relationships. Thanks for your patience and guidance. We pray God will bless and strengthen you in these closing weeks of your term as bishop and as you move on into pastoral ministry.

ARTICLE VI BOARD FOR MINISTRIES

Pastors were encouraged to request financial assistance through Bishop Cober's office so that all interested young people could participate. Young persons from the Dayspring Covenant and Bethel congregations did attend and enjoyed the experience.

We have also requested that MCC (Mennonite Central Committee) add all Southeast Conference pastors to their mailing list for Shoulder Tapper newsletter and other appropriate mailings. Your Board members serve as the Regional contact persons for MDS (Mennonite Disaster Service). We would encourage pastors and congregations to use the wide variety of services and resources available through this Agency with which the Brethren in Christ identifies closely. If you have questions about how to attain these resources, please ask us.

Through the capable leadership of Lynn Oyer the Board is promoting the Jubilee curriculum for use in our Sunday School Departments beginning with the Fall 1994 quarter. Please stop by the display during this Annual Meeting and be in touch with Lynn with your questions.

We are encouraged by the growth of our Conference and believe that the panel discussion dealing with "assimilation" on Saturday morning of this Annual Meeting will be inspiring and instructive for each of us.

On behalf of our Board, I want to express our deep gratitude for the leadership Bishop Cober has provided for us during these past four years. He has been patient with us as we began the formation of a new conference and a new board structure. His years of experience in the church have been a rich resource for us. We have enjoyed "Brother Lou" as bishop, brother, and friend. Our Board would ask this Annual Meeting to go on record expressing gratitude to God and to Bishop Cober for his service among us. We pray that the Lord will make the time of transition to pastoral assignment easy for our brother and sister.

ARTICLE VII REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVE TO BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION

The work of the Board of Administration these past two years has centered around **denominational priorities**. The Brethren in Christ purpose statement includes four: community (fellowship), worship, evangelism, and discipleship. The church currently is focusing on the last two, helping congregations reach more lost people and develop more believers into mature, committed Christians.

Toward that end, the BDA has tried to **refine the structure** General Conference adopted in '90. Our goal is a streamlined organization with gifted persons at regional and general levels who can help pastors develop local leadership that fosters numerical and spiritual growth.

The BDA has attempted to retain basic principles of Vision Planning, while addressing inequities in workloads, facing financial realities, and considering varied viewpoints. Based on

feedback we discarded our original interim concept for an ongoing plan. Actually,, **the latest proposal offers two plans**, or options, for General Conference to consider. Both call for five full-time regional bishops, based on available finances and the confidence that five qualified regional leaders can serve the entire church effectively.

Option A retains eight regions. Tennessee and Kentucky churches would return to the Central Conference. The remainder of the Southeast would share a bishop with the Atlantic Conference.

Option B reorganizes the BIC into five conferences. Seven of eight regions would experience change. Tennessee and Kentucky would rejoin the Central, while Virginia, Georgia, and Florida would join the southern parts of the Allegheny and Susquehanna Conferences in a new region of 50 churches.

Providing alternatives hopefully will stimulate creative thinking and give General Conference freedom to pursue whatever direction seems best for the church's future. Each listed option offers certain advantages.

Option A keeps **most regional boundaries intact**. Option B **eliminates duplicate administrative loads** for bishops and redraws boundaries by more natural geographic lines. Both options try to **equalize bishops' workloads** by considering not only number of churches, but their sizes and needs, geographical factors, etc. Both align the southeast area with a conference closer by and offer the resources of larger churches and greater funds.

Both options also **reduce general leadership positions** (General Church Leaders, Bishops, Executive Directors) from 13 to 10, leaving more Cooperative Ministries funds for ministries like missions and church planting. Since bishops will carry mostly regional responsibilities and follow revamped job descriptions, they will be able to serve more churches effectively than in the past.

Returning the Tennessee and Kentucky churches to the Central Conference creates pain for all of us. However, no one has discovered an equitable solution for five bishops that does not involve boundary changes somewhere. Despite the difficulties of

this move. BOA thinks that the Central Conference bishop's priority on resourcing and revitalizing smaller, older congregations will serve these eight churches well, and that the Central Conference can develop a bond among its pastors and churches similar to what the Southeast has done.

If this proposal passes, a revised Southeast will face **crucial tasks**: 1) developing a positive working relationship with the Atlantic Conference; 2) defining ministry goals and strategy for the region; 3) fashioning closer relationships between Spanish-speaking and English-speaking congregations; 4) providing pastors on-the-job training and resources.

The BOA found time this past biennium for **other issues** also. The General Church Leaders search process, a "historical practices" statement connected to the new doctrinal statement, budgets and other financial matters, the Messiah College Covenant, brotherhood health insurance, and Nominating Committee work formed some of our agenda. The BOA regional representatives also convened as the Board of Appeals to resolve a congregational dispute. The past two years have provided a lapful of challenges.

With mixed emotions I terminate my work as the Southeast BOA representative this summer. I will leave Highland Park to pastor the Chambersburg, PA congregation. My roots lie in the Southeast, however, and my heart will remain partly here as well. Fortunately the Chambersburg church carries an interest in this region and has been an active sister congregation to Grace Community here in Atlanta. Hopefully I can continue to assist the Southeast vision even while living outside its boundaries.

I'm grateful for the chance to have served you. I feel I've been part of something special. Thanks for the memories.

**ARTICLE IX
GENERAL CHURCH REPORTS**

A. GENERAL CHURCH LEADERS REPORT

Greetings! As servant leaders of the denomination, it is a joy to share with you some of our ministry which has occurred since we last met with you in a regional conference setting. It is a mutual responsibility to serve Christ and the church. We count it a privilege to be partners in the family we call Brethren in Christ.

This report will focus primarily on our collective work. Thus, we will not identify major issues or sections of our time relating to our individual job descriptions.

During the past year we have met an average of twice a month in sessions that encompassed a full day. We consulted with each other weekly about situations that needed our collective insights. Working together in the same office facilitates this kind of communication.

Our work has included the following:

1. Under the direction of the Board of Administration (BOA) we

have given significant energy and time to help fulfill the mandate of General Conference to refine our polity (see P 63, 1992 Minutes). As workers together we have assisted BOA in preparing a proposal that is being shared for information at regional conferences and will be in the General Conference agenda for the event of July 2 - 7, 1994.

The preparation of this document involved a number of very significant steps. Some of these included: extended fall and spring sessions of BOA by a full day to give concerted thought to how we can best serve the church in a rapidly changing world; we were involved in 23 "dialogues" across the denomination; numerous personal and written presentations were received and considered.

2. The General Church Leaders (GCL) have met three times with the bishops and twice with the Council on Ministries and Mission (CMCM) during the past year. These are strategic opportunities for vision shaping and communication. Additionally we met numerous times with the Program Committee in preparation for General Conference.
3. For the second year, the GCLs and Regional Bishops called the church to prayer and fasting the first week of January. We have been encouraged to hear reports of involvement, praying for renewal locally and denominationally, and for God's guidance as we move forward with our priorities of evangelism and discipleship.
4. Working with the Bishop's Selection Committee has been a major task. Fifteen meetings in Allegheny, Atlantic, Central, Midwest, Pacific, Susquehanna and Southeast Conferences were necessary because of our new MANUAL OF DOCTRINE AND GOVERNMENT (MDG) provisions for the selection of bishops. We find the present selection method unwieldy and costly, thus requiring serious reconsideration.
5. We appreciate your financial support for the general ministries of the denomination. Your consistent funding of our common mission, regionally and denominationally, makes it possible to care for administration and outreach at home and overseas.

Giving continues to increase and for this we thank the Lord. At the same time we recognize the trend to expend an increasing percentage of our income at the local church. For example, in 1986 - 79.9% of total receipts were used at the congregational level as compared to 1988 - 81.5%, and 1990 - 83.3%. In 1992 this has increased to 85.1%. This calls for adjustments at the denominational level.

6. The GCLs continue to monitor and provide direction for our priorities of evangelism and discipleship. Each Bishop has tailored this focus to fit the needs of his regional conference which makes the approach flexible, having a higher potential for effectiveness. As we all work together on our priorities, we are confident that the Lord of the harvest will provide appropriate results.
7. The Moderator and the Secretary were participants in the Messiah College Presidential Search Committee.
8. Each of us will have been at every regional conference over the course of the past two biennia. These have been valuable "connectional" contacts. Listening to the heartbeat of the regional conference enables us to be more effective in helping shape the direction of the denomination.

We covet your continued support: spiritually as you pray for us; morally through mutual dialogue, and financially as we all seek to find ways to make Cooperative Ministries relative and challenging.

B. REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION

SHAPING THE FUTURE

April 6, 1994

Introduction

1992 General Conference requested the Board of Administration to "plan how our structures can be refined to best carry out our beliefs and priorities. This includes, among other things, evaluation and review of the following:

- The number of general church administrators such as general church leaders, bishops, executive directors and associates.
- The number of general church boards
- The administration, size and structure of the regional conferences.
- The funding of general and regional ministries" (1992 Minutes, p. 63).

In order to accomplish this assignment, all of our BOA meetings were extended by a full day, twenty-three "dialogue sessions" were held across the denomination, and we have received numerous "presentations" both verbal and written. After listening to many opinions, the BOA made a concerted effort to give fair and wise consideration to concerns, while at the same time providing leadership for the denomination to move forward with its priorities of evangelism and discipleship.

Our Missions

"The purpose of the Brethren in Christ Church is to foster a fellowship of believers whose objective is to worship and obey the triune God and to proclaim His gospel to all people" (p.3, MDG). Our purpose defines who we are and want to be as Brethren in Christ.

In this purpose statement the Brethren in Christ have identified four significant elements that we believe are transferable concepts or principles essential for any culture or generation.

Those elements are: community, worship, discipleship and evangelism. None of the four may be omitted; all are essential to retain the integrity of who we are.

For the five-year period of 1991 to 1996 we have focused our direction and energy by selecting the two priorities of evangelism and discipleship. This was done to supplement our strengths.

To accomplish our purpose, we must give more emphasis and energy to leadership development than we have done in the past. We need leaders, especially at the pastoral level, who will effectively assist people in growth in all of the dimensions stated in our purpose. The development of such pastors will require the help and cooperation of all denominational leaders.

We believe a polity that is lean and geared to serve will best fulfill our purpose and mission.

Facing our Future

As we face the future a number of dynamics confront the church. One of the primary issues is finances. The Brethren in Christ experienced a major shift in funding trends. For the first time in over 30 years our total giving decreased, having received a million dollars less in 1993 than in 1992. Also, congregations are keeping a higher percentage of their funds at the congregational level. Similar denominations are experiencing these same shifts.

We must respond to this trend responsibly and sensitively so that we can empower congregations both to do the work of evangelism and discipleship locally and to be a connectional church with appropriate participation in the Brethren in Christ throughout North America and around the world.

There are many other reasons for the Brethren in Christ to continue to refine our polity. We must be able to clearly and effectively communicate the message of salvation in a post-Christian culture. We can better evangelize and disciple the builder, boomer and buster generations as we shape our structures to adequately relate to and meet their needs.

Concurrently with evangelism our desire to "make disciples" causes us to consider new paradigms for effectively incorporating new Christians into the church. This is especially important given our unique synthesis of Pietism and Anabaptism, Wesleyanism and evangelicalism. We need to also have a polity that reflects our accent on community to counter individualism, the pervasive breakdown of family life, and increasing conflict in our society.

This revised polity calls for a shift of our time and energy. We believe the following reasons and recommendations will help us to facilitate the mission of the Brethren in Christ Church.

GENERAL CONFERENCE ADMINISTRATION

Whereas the BOA has given much study to the leadership and administration of the general church and

Whereas it is perceived that we need to clarify the role of those who form policy and those who are employed to administer and

Whereas there was a call to bring the General Church Leaders, Regional Bishops, and Executive Directors together for prayer and planning with decision-making responsibility, it is therefore

1. RECOMMENDED

The present Board of Administration become a policy board called THE GENERAL CONFERENCE BOARD composed of 2 General Church Leaders, 1 Treasurer, 8 Regional Conference Members, 3 General Board Chairpersons, and 3 members at large. It will meet at least annually.

The administration of the church will be done by the LEADERSHIP COUNCIL composed of the 2 General Church Leaders, 5 Regional Bishops, and 3 Executive Directors (Board for Stewardship Services, Board for Media Ministries, Board for World Missions). The Council will meet quarterly. The duties of these two groups are detailed in the Manual of Doctrine and Government articles VIII and IX of the Bylaws. As the general church, these two groups will work together to give leadership to the regions and congregations.

Whereas the purpose and function of general church boards were reviewed and

Whereas the work and ministries (brotherhood concerns, congregational life, and evangelism and church planting) have become increasingly focused in regional conferences and congregations and

Whereas we discern that general ministries can be responsibly managed with less general church boards it is therefore

2. RECOMMENDED

That as of 1994 General Conference we discontinue the present general boards of Board for Brotherhood Concerns, Board for Congregational Life, Board for Evangelism and Church Planting, and Board for Ministry and Doctrine. These ministries will be assigned to the Leadership Council with appropriate persons/groups carrying designated responsibilities. And it is further

3. RECOMMENDED

That a Task Force be named by the General Church Leaders for the 1994-1995 biennium composed of the current administrative directors and two persons each from the BBC, BCL, and BECP to assign finance, insure transition, and provide continuity for the ongoing ministries of these boards.

REGIONAL CONFERENCE ADMINISTRATION

Whereas the 1992 General Conference called for a review of how to best administer the present eight regional conference and

Whereas there has been much dialogue, many opinions, and consideration of management factors and financial resources and

Whereas the General Conference desired to have options for regional administration, the BOA therefore

RECOMMENDS TWO OPTIONS:

OPTION A

That we have 8 regional conferences with 5 bishops as follows:

Allegheny/Susquehanna	-	1 Bishop
Atlantic/Southeast (less KY & TN)	-	1 Bishop
Canada	-	1 Bishop
Central (including KY & TN)	-	1 Bishop
Midwest/Pacific	-	1 Bishop

OPTION B

That we have five regional conferences with five bishops as follows

Atlantic:	Present Atlantic & North of Interstate 76 PA Turnpike, plus churches from Allegheny (10) and Susquehanna (18).
Canada:	No change
Central:	Former Central
West:	Former Midwest and Pacific Conferences
Southeast:	Present Allegheny & south of Interstate 76 PA Turnpike, plus churches from Susquehanna (13) and Southeast - except KY (6) and TN (3).

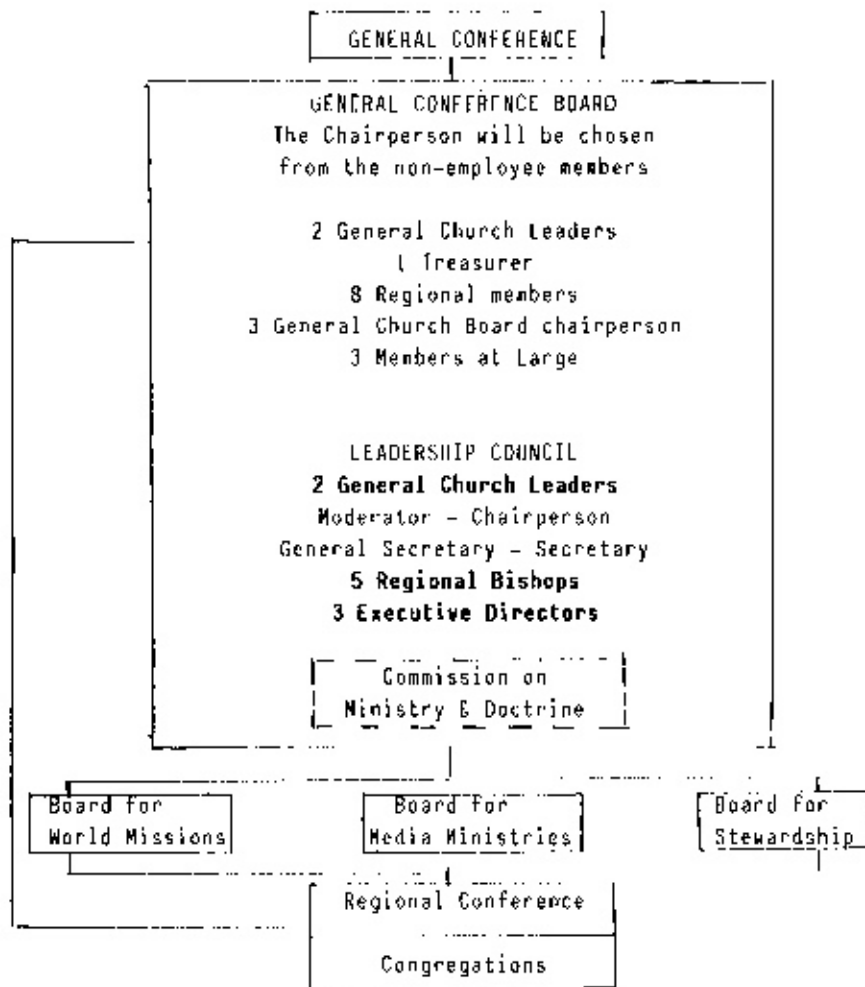
The details of how we implement the selection and tenure of all general church administrators is within the proposed bylaws.

The proposals include reductions of at least three funding units along with other secretarial reductions. We believe this polity will adequately serve the congregations. The following flow chart is to assist our understanding. It is not presented for adoption.

Portfolios of the present BBC, BCL, BECP, BMD will assigned to persons in the Leadership Council. It should be noted that this flow chart has gone through several revisions and probably does not reflect the final concepts to be presented to General Conference.

ARTICLE X RECOMMENDATION TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

After considerable discussion of the "Shaping the Future" proposal from the Board of Administration report, the following recommendation was submitted from the floor of the Annual Meeting by motion of Dennis Ritchey with seconded by J. Richard Lehman.

Whereas Southeast Conference is in the process of proving itself, and

Whereas we are experiencing growth and fellowship as a new conference, and,

Whereas there has been a deep sense of bonding between our churches and local leaders, and

Whereas we believe that our fellowship and growth is an indication of God's blessing, we therefore

Recommend to General Conference that Kentucky and Tennessee churches remain a part of the Southeast Conference.

ACTION: The recommendation was **approved without dissent** by the Annual Meeting of the Southeast Conference meeting at Grace Community Church, Lawrenceville, Georgia on Saturday, April 30, 1994.

ARTICLE XI CAMP FREEDOM

A. General Report

A very helpful tool for world Christians is the book (not a B.I.C. book) **Operation World** available from the missions office. The 1993 Missions Prayer Fellowship financial projects were: training for native church leaders in some of the countries where the Brethren in Christ serve (adult project) and supplies for the missionary homes and children in Malawi (Jimilila Jesu children's project). The adult project fell short of its goal of \$11,000 and we have yet to receive a full report on the children's giving. In September, the new children's project, "Good News for Nepal", began. It is being prepared by the Southeast Conference. The adult project for the calendar year 1994 will be to build a Prayer House for Punea.

We have accomplished some of the goals we set before you last year: visiting some of the congregations in the conference and using the opportunity to promote B.I.C. missions; the five Kentucky congregations had their first annual missions conference, the missionaries from that meeting went on to visit the Tennessee congregations. The challenge continues as we trust God to speak to the adults, youth and children of the Southeast Conference to pray, give and go so that the Great Commission might be fulfilled.
