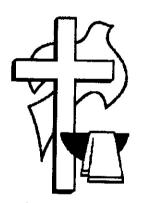

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ARTICLE I: OPENING SESSIONS

The Fifth Annual Meeting of the Southeast Conference of the Brethren in Christ Church was held at Holden Park Church, Orlando, Florida Friday evening and Saturday, April 28 and 29, 1995

At the Friday evening Rally we were led in worship and praise by the Worship Team from Community Bible Chapel under the leadership of Pastor Larry Woomert. Bishop Warren Hoffman brought the conference message on "Traits of a Great Church" based on Acts 11: 19-30 and 13: 1-3. He challenged us with three characteristics of a great church: (1) reaching the unreached, unsaved, unchurched, (2) discipling the undiscipled and (3) sending the unsendable.

Following the evening worship a time of fellowship was enjoyed.

On Saturday morning the Board for Ministries directed an interaction time on the theme "Cluster - A Great Asset". After several interviews regarding what is happening within some of the clusters, the conference body was dispersed into their cluster to discuss ways of fostering activities within their cluster.

Bishop Hoffman called the Annual Meeting into session at 8:30 AM on Saturday, April 29. Pastor Kenneth Gibson of the Dayspring congregation, Harrisonburg, Virginia, brought the devotional message, looking at the attitudes of the father in the story of the Prodigal Son from Luke 15:11-31. He pointed out that the father exhibited (1) persistent hope, (2) authentic (unconditional) love, (3) genuine enthusiasm and (4) remained free of bitterness and resentment. We need to practice these same attitudes to each other in the Body of Christ.

ARTICLE IV: BISHOP'S ANNUAL REPORT

As sovereign Head of the Church, Jesus Christ commissions us to make disciples of all the world's peoples and to be a redemptive influence in the world, seeking to overcome evil with good. In fulfillment of this mission, we proclaim the gospel to all people and minister to human need.

In many ways this seems to be a time of opportunity for us in the Southeast Conference. We have a fine team of pastors. A number of our congregations are reporting growth. Giving is getting stronger. New congregations are emerging.

To meet these opportunities, we are pressing forward in our concerted endeavors. Our aim is to promote the worship of God, growth of Christ's Church, evangelization of the unsaved, and redemptive service to the world.

The results of these cooperative endeavors are encouraging. As we pursue our vision of 40 growing congregations, we now have 33 congregations. Eighteen of these congregations reported membership growth in 1994.

A number of our congregations have experienced notable advances in membership. Bloomington Chapel gained 17 new members. Kendall and Maranatha increased by 15. Dayspring added 11. Aposento de la Gracia and Hialeah East received 9 new members. An increase of 135 members brings our total conference membership to 1,679.

In our support of church-wide ministries, the congregations of the Southeast Conference contributed a total of \$33,650 to Cooperative Ministries in 1994. This is an increase of \$989 over last year's giving.

A number of our congregations are giving a significant percentage of their congregational budget to Cooperative Ministries. East Lake is giving 11%; DeRossett, Holden Park and Pomeroy Chapel, 10%, Rolling Acres, 9% and Bethel and Campbellsville, 8%.

Seven congregations are to be commended for "stretching" to increase their giving to Cooperative Ministries by additional percentages of their total giving -- Campbellsville, DeRossett, Holden Park,

Lynchburg, and New Beginnings.

I am excited to welcome one new pastoral couple to our team of pastors in the Southeast Conference. In 1994 our pastoral team was enhanced by the addition of Mike and Pattie Blouse.

Our pastors benefit from an annual retreat. At our annual Pastors and Spouses Retreat this past April, Don Shafer, our General Secretary, led our pastoral leaders in a time of spiritual renewal.

To provide additional encouragement and counsel to our pastors, we have expanded our network of mutual support—so that all of our pastors have the opportunity to meet regularly with one or more others, stay in touch, share insights, receive counsel, and share vision and strategies.

As I serve our conference, I am indebted to leaders who serve with me. At this Annual Meeting Elizabeth Gramm completes four years of outstanding service as our conference secretary. Larry Steffee cares well for the financial concerns of the conference. As conference member, Lester Zook is an insightful participant on the General Conference Board. With our Board of Directors, these officers serve the conference with wisdom and insight.

Working behind the scenes in our conference office, Deb Kay is a pleasant and efficient executive secretary. She is assisted by Fran Book and, from time to time, by Ettie Miller, Wanda Heise, Karen Haldeman and Ruth Cober, who serve as volunteers.

Vital to me is the partnership of my family. With your encouragement and intercession, our family has made a good adjustment to my enlarged responsibilities in the work of bishop. Though Connie does not generally accompany me on visits to churches, she does join me from time to time at conference events. Most of the time she serves from our home as my principal intercessor, encourager, advisor and partner in ministry.

The General Church Board (the new name for the primary governing board of the denomination) has announced a vision for the Brethren in Christ Church in North America — to be 250 Growing, Discipling, and Sending Congregations by A.D. 2000. As a conference

we have a <u>purpose</u> statement, but have not yet decided on a <u>vision</u>. In response to this vision, it seems appropriate to enlarge our vision as a conference. In dialogue with our Board of Directors and Board for Ministries, I believe the Spirit is calling us to become 40 Growing, Discipling, and Sending Congregations by A.D.2000. Our Board of Directors and Board for Ministries feel that it would be good for our vision to mesh with the one for the larger church—that we can aim to be 40 Growing, Discipling, and Sending Congregations by A.D. 2000. (This projects at least one new congregation a year in Miami and three or four at other points in the conference.)

In the sovereign purposes of God, now is the time to press forward. The Spirit is moving. The Church is casting vision. People are praying. Pastors are working. Volunteers are pitching in. By the enabling grace of God, we can be 40 growing, discipling, and sending congregations by A.D. 2000. Will you join me in working toward the fulfillment of this vision?

ARTICLE V.. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

A. General

This past year has been one of challenge and, to some degree, change for the Board of Directors as we have welcomed a new leader, Bishop Warren Hoffman.

In October 1994 we met in joint session with the Board for Ministry at Roanoke, Virginia. Our purpose was to acquaint Bishop Hoffman with the work of our boards through a review of the Conference over the past four years and then to look together to the future. We spent considerable time discussing our vision and goals for the Conference and evaluating structure and methods for achieving those goals.

We see two major goals: (1)To create unity and mutuality amidst the diversity represented in our Conference and (2) to see enlargement and growth. We need mature congregations able to foster and shepherd

new churches.

One of the methods for achieving these goals will be through development of relationships and leadership within the natural clusters in our conference. Bishop Hoffman has been working on ideas and methods to foster development of the clusters into working, caring, growing support groups.

In the afternoon the two boards met in separate sessions to work on their specific agendas. The Board of Directors has dealt with requests for loan guarantees from the Bethel congregation in Virginia for their new facility and from Community Bible Chapel in Sarasota, Florida for roof repair.

We continue to be in dialog with the Dayspring Covenant congregation relative to their continuing financial crisis and the impending sale of their property. At the time of our January 1995 meeting an offer had been made for the property and loan approval was in process. Hopefully, by the time of the Annual Meeting we can give you a final report on this situation.

The board met again January 26, 1995 in Sarasota, Florida. As a part of that session, we dialogued with Moderator Harvey Sider regarding the evaluation process for Bishop Hoffman. Results of that process will be reported to this Annual Meeting by the General Church leader present.

We approved the revised budgets for 1995 and 1996 and the proposed budget for 1997 to be presented to this Annual Meeting. The Board discussed ways and means of encouraging involvement of our pastors and spouses in "Renewal 95" the denominational retreat to be held at Messiah College in July and of giving incentive grants to congregations planning specific outreach/evangelism programs.

We are also developing a procedure for evaluating and reaching a determination on loan guarantee requests. A committee was appointed to develop guidelines for travel expenses for boards and committees involved in the work of the conference.

As part of our ongoing discussion of vision and goals for the Southeast Conference and in conjunction with the Vision Statement adopted by the General

Conference Board and Leadership Council, we are issuing the challenge to the Southeast Conference to grow to 40 congregations by 2000. This means at least eight (8) new congregations.

As part of our review of the structure and function of the conference we are bringing a recommendation to the Annual Meeting to clarify the wording of the procedure relative to the election of the Conference Secretary and Treasurer. (Bylaws, Section IX. C). There was also discussion concerning the size of the Board for Ministry.

We thank each of you for your support and prayer as we endeavor to give support to our Bishop in the leadership of the Southeast Conference.

B. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. The Board of Directors recommends to this Annual Meeting of the Southeast Conference that we accept the Invitation of the Millerfields Brethren in Christ Church, Columbia, Kentucky, to host our Annual Meeting in 1996 on Friday evening and Saturday, April 26 and 27, 1996.

Action: Adopted

2. Bylaw Revision, Section IX.C Southeast Conference Officers

Whereas the current bylaws, Section IX C. regarding the election of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Conference is unclear as to method, the Board of Directors recommends to the Annual Meeting, that Section IX C be amended to read as follows:

"The Secretary/Treasurer or the Secretary and Treasurer as the case may be, shall

be **nominated** by a majority of the Board of Directors and **confirmed** by the Annual Meeting."

ACTION: Adopted

3. Bylaw Revision Section XI

Due to the changes in the denominational structure on which the original size of the Board for Ministry was based, and to better reflect our conference demographics (ie. the natural clusters) and for better stewardship of funds in meeting expenses and ease of scheduling with fewer people, the Board of Directors recommends that the size of the Board for Ministry be reduced from nine (9) to seven (7) members plus the Bishop.

Therefore Item A would read:
"The Board for Ministries shall be composed of the Bishop and not fewer then <u>seven</u> others chosen by the Southeast Conference by a majority vote of all voting members present at the Annual Meeting. The terms of the Board for Ministry shall be for a period of three (3) years"

C. ANNOUNCEMENT - Calvary Bible Church

The Calvary Bible Church in Accomac, on the east shore of Virginia, was founded by Irving Parker eleven years ago. Three years ago the group purchased an attractive professional building for \$120,000 and converted this into a church facility. At this point a group of around 50 people worship together regularly.

After eleven years, the congregation is aware of some needs which are not easily met as an independent congregation. They would like to have access to a larger network of evangelists and missionaries. They feel that an affiliation with the Brethren in Christ

Church would increase their credibility and durability as a congregation.

At the request of the congregation, Bishop Hoffman traveled to Accomac on March 18-19 for exploratory conversations. In his report to our Board of Directors, the bishop reported that the congregation seems to be solid, with doctrinal compatibility, openness to our polity, and a readiness to participate in our normal interactions. While there is not a cluster of congregations at present, this would give us a "beachhead" on Virginia's east shore.

On April 1 at a congregational meeting, members of the Calvary Bible congregation voted unanimously to request affiliation with the Brethren in Christ Church. On April 12 Bishop Hoffman received a letter from the congregation with this request.

At a meeting yesterday, April 28, our Board of Directors approved receiving the Calvary Bible congregation as a congregation of the Southeast Conference, to be final once the deed to the property is rewritten to include the necessary clause from the Manual of Doctrine and Government of the Brethren in Christ Church. On our part, we need to approve three trustees for the Calvary Bible Brethren in Christ Church. Those names are included in the confirmation for all Southeast Conference Trustees.

ARTICLE VI: BOARD FOR MINISTRIES REPORT

Since this Annual Meeting represents the completion of the first five years of Southeast Conference, as well as, the ending of one term for a significant number of our board, I would like to briefly review these past five years. The Board for Ministries first met August 3, 1991 in Roanoke. At that time we discussed needs of our conference and accepted the following as our goals: (1) "To develop an awareness of God's power and presence in the lives of our pastors and lay leaders". (2) "To form new churches in areas where we have existing churches". We identified strategies by which we hoped to reach those goals.

In January, 1992 we sponsored one person's participation in the "Facing Family Abuse" conference held at Crossroads Brethren in Christ Church. There is a complete set of tapes of this conference available for loan through our Board.

Toni Anderson, who represented our conference on the General Church Board for Congregational Life, was involved in the production of the slide/video show "Our Family Album". There were a number of slides from Southeast Conference churches in that presentation which was first shown at General Conference, 1992.

We have planned for workshop/seminars to be held at Annual Meetings. These have included:

1992 - What Makes that New Church Brethren in Christ?

Who are the Brethren in Christ - Our

Identity in the 90s Facing Family Abuse: How Should We Respond?

- 1993 How to Develop Effective Children's Ministries
 Sonlife What Is It?
 Evangelism and Discipleship
 Women in Leadership
- 1994 Panel discussion addressing assimilation: how do we invite and extend our welcome?, how do we make others an integral part of the church family?
- 1995 Interviews with several pastors about cluster activities followed by discussion within our cluster groupings.

We actively promoted YOUth Quest held December 27-30, 1993, at Tamiment Resort, Tamiment, PA. The Board provided for financial assistance through the bishop's office so that all interested young people could participate. A number of young people from the Dayspring Covenant and Bethel congregations attended and enjoyed the experience.

Through the General Church Board for Brotherhood Concerns we requested money for the purchase of 20 transmitter/receivers for the Miami churches to use at Southeast Conference events and General Church events. These were used for the first time at General Conference 1994 at Messiah College and greatly enhanced the ability of our Spanish brothers and sisters to enjoy their time at Conference. This equipment is being used this weekend here at our Annual Meeting.

Our Board and some of our spouses participated in the Miami Caucus in February, 1994. This was a time of inspiration; a time to build friendships across the language barriers; and a time to reflect upon the growth of the Kingdom in the city of Miami. As you have read through your annual meeting agendas you will have noted that there are now 12 (twelve) congregations in Miami. Praise the Lord for the continued growth of the church and for the committed leadership this growth indicates and requires.

Board for Evangelism and Church Planting Task Force members from our Board have visited the Miami area a number of times as the pastors with Eduardo's leadership have looked for suitable properties for the rapidly growing congregations. We welcome the support and involvement of the entire Brethren in Christ Church in the above budget project to raise \$700,000 during the first three to four months of 1995 for the purpose of building a facility for our brothers and sisters in Miami. As a Board we thank every congregation in Southeast Conference for contributing as much as you could.

We have also requested that MCC (Mennonite Central Commitee) add all Southeast Conference pastors to their mailing list for Shoulder Tapper newsletter and other appropriate mailings. Your Board members serve as the Regional Contact Persons for MDS (Mennonite Disaster Service. We want to continue encouraging pastors and congregations to use the wide variety of services and resources available through this Agency with which the Brethren in Christ identifies closely.

Through the capable leadership of Lynn Byer the Board promoted the Jubilee curriculum for use in our Sunday School Departments beginning with the Fall 1994 quarter. We will miss the enthusiasm and energy which Lynn brought to her assignment. Should you have unanswered questions about Jubilee please see that you talk to either Wanda Gibson or myself. We will find the answers for you.

During the past six months the Board, along with Bishop Hoffman, has been promoting the development of cluster groups within the conference. There are seven natural groupings based on our geography. It is our goal to see these clusters (1) become invaluable sources of support, training, and inspiration for our

pastors, and (2) develop and sponsor combined activities such as the annual Missions Rally and quarterly youth activities held by the Kentucky congregations.

Thank you for the trust you have placed in our Board and for the privilege and responsibility of working with you during these first years in the development of Southeast Conference. We welcome your questions and your suggestions. We need your prayer support, as together with you, we work to fulfill the Great Commission "...go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." We do all of that knowing we have His promise "And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.' (Matthew 28: 19,20).

ARTICLE VII: REPORT OF REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVE TO THE GENERAL CHURCH BOARD

The Denomination

Since last July's General Conference in Grantham, what had formerly been the Board of Administration has become the General Conference Board. More than simply a change in nomenclature, however, this has been a change in function. Specifically, the attempt has been to move from being a representative board to a policy board. This shift has been manifest in encouragements to think more widely than just our constituencies when making decision, and to avoid "micro-managing" in organizational operation. It also appears to me that, to some extent, the newly formed Leadership Council will be assuming some of the creative and program development functions previously carried by the B.O.A.

In other denominational business, I served as a

member of the Task Force on Regional Conference Administration. At the 1994 General Conference, the Body directed a designated task force to "develop a plan complete with structure, personnel, implementation, that would place a resident bishop in each of the eight regional conference." (Minutes, p. 82) The task force met all afternoon January 12 to begin work. This is a complex issue, for we feel keenly in our churches the need for a bishop's close attention. Nevertheless, to fund eight bishops will force us to ask hard questions about our broad priorities. Are we willing, for example, to provide a bishop for each conference if it means directing resources away from other areas (such as missions or church planting) that have traditionally been important to Brethren in Christ people? Numbers of options were explored in January. Some of these included eight resident bishops with some of them part time and phased in over time, realigning regional boundaries, or using pastors as "under-shepherds" or Our work continues on this "cluster leaders". project.

I am particularly excited about the vision adopted by the General Church Board for the Brethren in Christ for the next five years:

"250 growing, discipling, and sending congregations by A. D. 2000"

This, it seems to me, is a challenging yet attainable goal. The Leadership Council will be working to develop objectives and plans for its implementations. I would suggest that we too could profit by some time taken discussing and focusing on our part in this vision.

The Region

The past year has seen mixed progress in the Southeast. Some congregations are consolidating, others are expanding, and some continue to struggle. More inspiring to me has been our Bishop's approach to strengthening our ministry. Recognizing our inherent groupings, and building on the "cluster approach" to congregational and pastoral support is not only

appropriate and promising — it is also a strategy that other bishops and regions are taking note of. I would heartily encourage us as laypeople and pastors to invest ourselves in our local cluster for our mutual benefit.

Beginning work with this board has been both educational and gratifying. I am increasingly impressed with the creativity and energy I sense in the ministries of the Southeast Conference. My personal goal for this year is to more broadly acquaint myself with the pastors and people who make up this region. I continue to be at your disposal, and I eagerly await your input.

ARTICLE VIII: REPORT FROM THE LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

The 1994 General Conference affirmed the plan to have the General Church Leaders, the Regional Bishops and three Executive Directors to be one administrative team. This group has met on three occasions. The first was an orientation time and a focus on leaders functioning as a team. The two major sessions were October 26-28, 1994, and January 10-12, 1995. For the first time in our history, all the general church administrators come together quarterly for prayer and planning.

In our sessions we counsel together on personnel issues, pastoral assignments, budget planning, promotion, and fund raising. We focus on the importance of developing leaders and communicating a common direction for our church family. We give time and energy to the ministries of brotherhood concerns, congregational life, evangelism and church planting, world missions, media ministries and the credentialing of ministers.

Perhaps the most significant thing we did was cast a vision. The General Conference Board has approved

·this vision and we are now developing goals, plans and implementation. The vision is

(See second part of this report.) It is our aim to report to General Conference stories of **vision-based** ministries that provide life in the Spirit among our churches. There is a strong sense of renewal. Indeed, Renewal '95 is an event this summer for all pastors and spouses that will continue to highlight a call to prayer and living in the power of the Holy Spirit.

We are in the process of preparing for the 1996 General Conference agenda. Of special interest to the regions will be our work on the number of regional conferences and resident bishops. We will have a more definitive report at the 1996 regional conference.

We seek your prayer support. Your counsel is welcome. Share ideas with your Bishop. All Bishops are integrally involved in our denominational thrust. We are finding excitement and fulfillment as we work together to build the household of God. We do this with God's people on the foundation of Christ Jesus. (Ephesians 2:19-22)

1. 250 Congregations - The beginning of our vision indicates our hope and plan of adding new congregations in North America. We now have 226

churches. Our regional conferences are projecting at least 24 new congregations over the next five years. To accomplish this will stretch us. We will need to prioritize and mobilize our personnel and financial resources for concerted endeavors in church planting to add this number of congregations by the year 2000.

- 2. Growing We envision every congregation adding people by conversion. Our vision must project plans for each congregation to win persons to saving faith in Christ and to bring them into membership. This means that we will need to focus on equipping our congregations for growth. Church leaders and pastors will help each congregation embrace a vision for evangelism and outreach. Healthy churches exalt Christ by growing in worship, obedience, witness and nurture.
- 3. Discipling This dimension reminds us that our vision will continue to uphold and communicate the biblical values that have set us apart as a unique community of believers. In an age of selfishness, materialism, individualism, loneliness and violence, we are called:

to proclaim the Lordship of Jesus Christ,

to live a holy, spirit-filled life,

to provide loving, caring and healing communities,

to model reconciliation and peacemaking,

to live simply and freely as Christ's disciples,

to give generously and live compassionately, and

to respond obediently to the Great Commission. Our commitment to these values will mold our personal life-styles, bond us in community, and motivate us to serve in ways that effect transformations in the lives of others.

4. Sending - Emerging from our concern for evangelism and discipleship is the desire to have congregations with an outward focus on mission. This calls for congregations to have a vision for sending finances and workers to neighbors next door and neighbors in the wider world. This means we

need to initiate more cross-cultural ministries in North America, as well as strengthen and accelerate our mission program overseas. Our history of sending believers from our congregations to places of witness and service throughout the world must continue to be part of our vision.

5. AD 2000 - As we approach the year 2000, many groups within the worldwide body of Christ are actively developing evangelism plans in a renewed commitment to the task of world evangelization. The Brethren in Christ Church in North American joins in this concerted effort for global evangelization.

All of this we do to build the body of Christ for the glory of God.
