#### A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

When selecting a play to direct, I read through countless one-act plays, debating what stories I wanted to put on stage. When I came across All in the Timing, I knew I had to do something from it. I had originally planned to only produce one of the plays from the set, but my mentors and advisors encouraged me to dream bigger, and so I added two more to the mix. All three of these plays fascinate me. Ives has given the director a fantastic series of comedies that allow for the implementation of a variety of directorial visions, offering a simple base of dialogue and story that the director can explode out from.

The Universal Language is a bear to work with. Almost entirely spoken in a made-up language, I played with several different options when trying to make this show understandable to an audience. While working with Dan and Jordan, we were able to create a show that uses nonverbal cues and subtext to display the dialogue's meaning. Keep an ear out for pop culture references, there's a lot of them!

The Philadelphia is, in my opinion, one of the most melodic plays I have ever read. The entire play reads like a sonata, beginning slow and languid, rising hurriedly, becoming absolutely manic, then slowing to a quiet finale. Try to hear the music of this play while watching it.

Finally, we have *Variations on the Death of Trotsky*, a play that expands off a major historic event of the early twentieth century, the assassination of Russian revolutionary, Leon Trotsky. Poking fun at the concepts of life, death, consciousness, and existence itself, this play is excessively comedic... until it's not.
