Images is an anthology of poems, prayers and short prose peices written by over ninety Christian women. It is a response to the need for women to express their deep feelings, frustrations, joys and longings. It is choosing a medium of beauty for theologizing. The attractive layout and accompanying pictures enhance that beauty.

Images cannot help but speak to the reader, male or female, middle-class or poor, for its personal statements are universal to the human heart, especially to the Christian. Try this for a poetic elucidation of Genesis 1:27:
