### Brethren in Christ Navajo Mission Farmington, N. Mexico

We wish to praise the Lord again for His gracious presence and help during this past three months. The major part of our time again was devoted to study of the Navajo language, in which we feel the Lord helped us greatly. Several trips were also made into the remoter sections of the Navajo country, to investigate conditions and possibilities and need for mission work. The burden of this work has increased upon our souls as we found more and more how un-

reached the larger part of this people are by the Gospel of Christ.

Due to the political situation on the reservation, we have felt it best to choose a location for the mission, in the large area of land populated by the Navajo, but not actually part of their reservation. The prospects seem favorable to obtaining such a suitable location. We would like to ask the prayers of the Lord's people in regard to this matter of location, as a good deal of the future of the work may be affected by the site we choose.

The past month and a half has been spent visiting some of the churches of the Brotherhood, under appointment of the Home Mission Board, and our hearts have been greatly blessed in meeting so many of the Lord's people, who have shown much interest in the advancement of His kingdom among men.

As we look forward to the coming year it is with anticipation of great things, as you pray, and the Lord further manifests His concern for the Navajo people, and moves their hearts toward Himself.

and inspiration. Others in the same ser-  
vice were Sr. Frey, Glen Hensel, and Bro.

slides of Beulah College and C. P. S. Camps.

Father's Day was observed in the Sunday  
School with a special message to fathers by  
the pastor and each father present was pre-  
sented with a small remembrance.

Our Summer Bible School proved to be a  
great blessing in itself and brought us in  
contact with several new and unchurched  
families. It was conducted July 1 to 12  
from nine to twelve each morning with an  
enrollment of 75. On the night of the clos-  
ing program a friend of one family came  
with them. Afterward he told the pastor  
that it was the first time in thirty years  
that he had been in church. The way of  
salvation was made plain by Scripture and  
Bible story as given by the children and  
we pray that this man and others may be  
touched and followed by the Holy Spirit to

years we have conducted a week-day Bible  
school each Wednesday from October to

prayers join hers that her husband may not  
only be kept from buying beer but may get  
thoroughly saved. We thank God for this  
ministry and pray that we shall see definite  
conversions from it. The new victrola is a  
gift from Bro. Leo Carlson in memory of  
his faithful and consecrated wife, Sr. Hazel  
Carlson who went to be with the Lord six  
months ago.

The Street Meetings have carried a testi-  
mony, too, to those who pass by, many of  
whom stop to listen. Many times we see  
those whom we have prayed for and long to  
see in our services. pass or stop to listen  
and they do hear the message and the songs  
as they go forth on the street.

**Christian Fellowship Mission, Massillon, O.**

We thank our Creator for His wonderful manifestations in our midst this past quarter. God has been graciously answering prayer from the beginning of this work, and shall continue as we walk by His side. The Power of God, in conversion, heart cleansing and healing, which can only be obtained through the efficacy of the Blood of Christ, has been proven the only rightful source of strength upon which finite beings can fully rely. We thank God for that power in the Blood, which wrought many miracles in the past, and we know, through the authenticity of the Word, it shall never lose its Power.

"Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." The Sunday School has a portion of responsibility in fulfilling this commission. To avoid conflicts with other schools in the community, the Sunday School hour begins at 2:15 P. M. With an enrollment of sixty-five, our average attendance, for the past three months, was sixty-three. The maximum attendance in this period reached one hundred forty-five. The last two Bible schools have been held, one at Spout Springs and the other in Gospel Hall, Knifley. Our Sunday School attendance has been favourable. The prayer meeting attendance has dropped a little, probably due to the shortness of the nights and the people working.

At the time of this writing our tent meeting is in progress at Spout Springs. Bro. Percy Cassel from Blair, Ontario is our evangelist. There have been a number of requests for prayer, but no seekers. #### Kentucky Clinic

"Can the nurse come down right away as Earl (a boy about 15 years old) is sick and we cannot get a doctor." This call came in at the Garlin station for a nurse, and that call came in last night (Sunday) just before we went to the night service. Then this morning another man came to the door and said his neighbor sent him up for a nurse because their baby has pneumonia and they too said they were unable to secure a doctor up until that time. You might well ask "what can a nurse do?"

The nurses at Knifley and here put forth special efforts to cooperate with the doctors and on cases as mentioned above they are very careful to stay within their field and yet give as much comfort and advice as possible many times urging them to see a doctor as soon as possible. Sometimes the nurse takes them to a doctor or hospital if it is a serious case.



The more important work is the ministering to the spiritual man as referred to in the nurses' reports. We are grateful for this open door through which many souls are contacted and some won for the kingdom. Pray for this great work. The future prospects are very promising. We are happy to welcome Sister Mary Heisey to our field. She will serve as community nurse at Knifley, replacing Gladys Kraybill Feese.

**Garlin**

"Hope thou in God for I shall yet praise him for the help of his countenance." There is much doubt, fear, and suffering in the world today, but the Christian has a bright hope. The devil hasn't armies enough to capture one saint of God who dares to trust Him.

My first nursing case about a week after I arrived in Kentucky was Mrs. Hallie Feese. She was a dear saint who suffered bravely and challenged many during those two weeks she suffered severe burns that took her life. Her hope in God took her safely through the door of Heaven.

From the beginning of the year for about two and a half months, nursing calls were almost continuous. I hardly had a chance to take care of necessary work between cases. Some had to be refused because I was busy on another case. There was a large variety of illnesses. Some of them are pneumonia, cerebral accident, meningitis, septicernia, phlebitis, flu, appendectomy, and measles. The measles epidemic was very severe, especially in one section. Few homes were missed and a number of families had six to eight who developed the measles.

Approximately ten cases of various types were treated with penicillin. It must be injected and usually was ordered every three hours night and day. A number of times I taught an individual in the home to give it which left me free for another person who was sick or other duties.

I had six calls to the hospital. They have been either at Lebanon, Glasgow, Maysville, or Danville. I spent about fifty nights away on calls either in the hospital or in homes. There were also many short calls. Approximately fifty cases were contacted. These contacts have meant much to me. While endeavoring to give physical help I also tried by God's help to aid them spiritually. There have been testimonies of those who have been helped along these lines as a result of these contacts for which we praise the Lord.

**Knifley Clinic**

For me the past year has had a very pleasant ending by having the opportunity of being community nurse at the Knifley clinic. Here I found many ways to practice the principles of midwifery and public health learned during my special studies with the Frontier Nursing Service.

The winter proved to be one of very little monotony. As the "flu", pneumonia, whooping cough and measles raged in the community, I sometimes wished for a "Haven of rest." The Lord was very gracious to keep my body well and able to meet the constant flow of demands for physical aid day and night.

A five-year old sorrel mare (trained riding) has proven a valuable asset to the work, especially during the bad winter months when many roads were impassable by car. We owe much gratitude to Rev. Charles Rife of Penna. for his sincere in-

terest and contribution in helping to make possible this means of transportation. This was prompted by a personal insight of the need. This affords the opportunity to reach more homes, giving relief to a greater number of the suffering. "Flicka", (the horse) and I have traveled many a stormy road together through cold, snow, and rain to care for a mother and baby or attempt to aid some suffering body and soul, always with the "Great Physician" invited to be our Guide and Medical Director.

During the worst winter months our clinic doctor, who comes to us from about fifty miles was unable to give us any assistance, thus increasing home calls and clinic work for the nurse. Sickness, bad roads, and high waters were his big hindrances, but we are glad to welcome him back again as spring bursts forth with its many advantages.

May I take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to the community folk who have given of their time and means to help keep the work moving, yes, even the children who so willingly helped me carry and rick the fuel wood in from snow and rain. It is quite encouraging to notice the varied ways in which the folk express their good-will toward the clinic assistance given them. This is a field with a bright future.

**North Star Mission Circuit,  
Meath Park, Sask.**

This past quarter has been one of hard work, and victory too. We have kept all the appointments with one exception, Melba, which we cancelled the first Sunday of May. Through the kindness of Mr. Fred Wayte, the Mission was given the use of a tractor and plow to put in the oats this spring. Another neighbor, Mr. Hislop, gave us the use of a double disc and cultipacker, and we appreciate this more than words can express. The mission rented from Mr. Wayte several acres of land for this summer, thus giving us a chance to rest the ground here and which is now in summer-fallow. The writer, in exchange for the rented land, gave forty hours of his time in driving Mr. Wayte's equipment for plowing and summerfallowing on Mr. Wayte's farm. For our own use of the tractor, the mission paid only for gasoline and oil. Neither of these neighbors are saved, and such kindness on not only their part but many of the other neighbors as well makes our hearts more eager to lead them to God.

While the duties of looking after the small farm take up much of our time, we are most happy to report that we have been encouraged to push our work forward. The first Sunday of April and May the writer visited Delisle for a Sunday evening service. In May we included Kindersley on our Delisle trip, taking the Mission staff along. The brethren at Kindersley were kind enough to postpone their communion service a few days to permit us to share it with them.

At Delisle the group was not large for the first service we had in April, but on our trip in May a large number were present. Some we understand had not been there for a long time. God's presence was keenly felt at the second service, and we hope it was a real encouragement to the faithful ones there.

We made the two hundred mile run between the morning service at the church here and the evening service at Delisle. We plan to begin a revival campaign at Delisle the fourteenth of July, and upon our return to Howard Creek begin our regular summer campaign the twenty-eighth. The writer plans to be the evangelist at both places. For the immediate future, North Star will continue to be interested in Delisle and make efforts to serve them once per month on the average.

In our immediate area of North Star, we have witnessed answers to prayers that ascended to God for many years. The interest

and attendance at the Sunday morning services has risen sharply. Since April the attendance has averaged 43 for the entire quarter. Since these figures are taken from the Sunday School count, it may be the attendance of the worship hour is still more, as there are some who do not always get to the Sunday School on time.

God has been visiting conviction upon some in this district. One mother confessed Christ as her personal Savior. It is our hope that home conditions will permit her to take the plain way and unite with the church. Several men have confessed their lack of Christ, saying they are not ready for the coming of the Lord. We are in real need of Christian men and fathers in this district. The last two prayer meetings in June are most outstanding; one because of the large number present and the fellowship enjoyed, the other because God's presence was so greatly with us. At this latter service, one Sister who had disobeyed God four years ago and removed her prayer veiling, asked God's pardon and has again put on the covering and thus has come again into full fellowship with the Church. Her spiritual freedom and joy is evidenced by public prayer and testimony. Sunday morning June 30 two children were publicly dedicated to the Lord.

Saturday morning, June first, our home was again blessed by the safe arrival of a little girl, Charlotte Kay. Mother and baby are both real well and all of us are happy. We were very grateful to the Nurse in charge of the Red Cross outpost near Paddockwood for the fine care she gave to Sr. Brechbill.

This past quarter had its share of the unforeseen and unexpected. Emergency trips to the hospital numbered two for this quarter. One, a little boy with a blood stream infected, is getting well rapidly at home. The second, a girl in Sr. Faus' class, underwent an operation as soon as we reached the hospital. She too is coming nicely. Another trip to a doctor was caused by a boy seriously injuring himself on broken glass at school.

With this report, we have been on the field nearly a year. We want to say we are glad we came. The privileges of service are unlimited, and in most cases the people appreciate what we try to do for them. We find this country to be both enjoyable and healthful, and we look forward to the coming year with anticipation of spiritual victory and progress. We all feel as Sr. Jones expressed herself the other day. "I feel now that I would miss something worthwhile this year if I didn't stay."

Just as this report was about to be mailed, we received the sad news of the death of Sr. Brechbill's sister-in-law in Wyoming, who leaves behind her husband and four young children.

Reviewing another quarter's activities gives us added encouragement to keep active at our post for God. Once more God has blessed in spite of some adverse conditions.

Attendance in all organizations and services held, for the most part, as the previous quarter with a slight increase in the Sunday School attendance.

On May 3 to May 5 we held a combined Youth Conference, Love Feast, and a service for reception of members. God's blessing was evidenced in many ways. May 3 and May 5 were given over to our Second Annual Youth Conference. Sister Grace Taylor, wife of the Presiding Elder of the Holiness Christian Church, spoke Friday night. Sunday morning our overseer, Bro. Henry Ginder, spoke and afterward received into the church Sister Ruth Sanders, a young sister of 21 years, who had to leave her home because she joined the Church. Pray for her, for this was no easy thing to do. During the afternoon and evening services Bishops J. Lester Myers and Samuel Wolgemuth spoke to us. Saturday was given over to the Love Feast. The preparatory service sermon was preached by Bro. Paul McBeth. In the evening Bishop J. Lester Myers gave us a very enlightening message on, "The Prayer Veiling as Taught by the Bible." The Conference was a greater blessing and greater in attendance than last year.

May 6 to May 26 we conducted our Annual Spring Revival Campaign. Since we were unable to secure an evangelist our pastor preached for us. God blessed in sending nine souls to the altar; increased the fervor of the Saints, as well as leading them into greater liberty in the services. New light was received with a willingness to walk in it. This resulted in Brother and Sister Jacob Hess joining the Church June 23. We thank God for what has been accomplished in this campaign and yet our souls cry out with a Holy discontent for God to come upon His Work more fully.

On Saturday night, June 15, we held our first Street Meeting of the season using the sound system equipped with two loud speakers.
